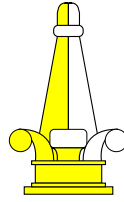

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Pupil Premium 2015-16

Background

The Government believes that the Pupil Premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals (FSM) and their wealthier peers by ensuring that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most.

The Pupil Premium is allocated to children from low-income families who are currently known to be eligible for FSM in both mainstream and non-mainstream settings and children who have been looked after continuously for more than six months.

The Government has decided that eligibility for the Pupil Premium will be extended to pupils who have been eligible for free school meals (FSM) at any point in the last 6 years. As a group, children who have been eligible for FSM at any point in time have consistently lower educational attainment than those who have never been eligible for FSM.

A premium has also been introduced for children whose parents are currently serving in the armed forces.

Allocation

Schools have been asked to report by academic year as this is more meaningful for parents. Whilst the grant allocation is made on the basis of financial years, schools both plan teaching and other support and conduct assessments over the academic year.

Impact of Pupil Premium Academic year 2015 -16: Spending

The school received a grant of £311,042 for Pupil Premium in the *academic year* 2015 – 2016 (7/12ths (A) + 5/12ths (B)). This money was used in a number of different ways to support the learning of the pupils concerned:

Despite low entry points, the percentage of PPG children achieving a Good Level of Development + (GLD+) was above the National average. This shows we are having a good impact on 'narrowing the gap'.

Year 1 Phonics Screening Check Results

86% of our Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) pupils in Year 1 achieved expected standards in their phonics test which is above the National average for all pupils and represents good progress given their low starting points.

83% of our Premium Grant (PPG) pupils who had to retake their phonics test achieved expected standards.

At the end of KS1 in reading, writing and maths the percentage of PPG children attaining 'Age expected standard' is above the National average. This shows that PPG pupils are making good progress over time.

At the end of KS2 our percentage of PPG children attaining 'Age expected standard' RWM is above the National average in both expected and Greater Depth. This shows that PPG pupils are making good progress over time.
