Welcome to our school.

This booklet has been compiled by our Parent Teacher and Friends Association (PTFA) especially for you, as a new family joining our school community. Starting school is an exciting milestone in a child's life. Joining our school is a great opportunity for parents to feel an even bigger part of the local community. This booklet aims to provide you with information about our PTFA which forms a part of school life.

Why do we have a PTFA?

We are fortunate at our school to have a PTFA that is and has been an integral part of the school community. The PTFA helps to raise funds to enhance our children's education experience and the school's facilities.

As fantastic as the fundraising is, our PTFA is about much more than simply raising money. The PTFA is an excellent way to bring parents and friends together socially in support of the school, working towards a common goal.

All families are automatically members of the PTFA when their child joins our school and everyone is encouraged to get involved.

The PTFA is extremely conscious of the inclusive ethos and diversity of our school, and we try very hard when organising and planning events to respect this.

As well as raising funds, the PTFA, plays an important part in building a strong community around the school:

- by getting to know parents and teachers outside your child's peer group
- by making little eyes sparkle at events created especially for them
- by learning to do new things as a team and thinking up new ideas
- by engaging with the local community on our doorstep
- making new friends and having fun

Not all of our events are run as fundraisers. Our children's disco, Easter Trail and The Big Picnic are run with the aim of giving the children a good time and as a way of thanking families for their continued support for the PTFA.

Charitable status

Charity law requires voluntary organisations with an annual income in excess of £5,000 to register with the Charity Commission for England and Wales. As a charity we must abide by Charity Commission rules and regulations.

Being a registered charity enables the PTFA to:

- receive charitable donations from local and national companies
- apply to grant-making charitable trusts; most charitable trusts will give grants only to groups formally recognised as charities
- receive donations made through payroll giving and company matched giving schemes
- apply for Gift Aid

Links with local businesses

We hope that over time, we can develop strong links with the local community and we are always very grateful for the support we do receive by both residents and businesses. Many of our local shops are very generous providing sponsorship; donations for raffle prizes, auction items etc and some have taken part in our winter and summer fairs. This support makes a huge difference to our school and children.

Our PTFA Committee

As the PTFA is a registered charity, it has to have an annually elected committee (drawn from parent volunteers). Committee members are a mix of parents from different year groups. Most of us come into the committee with little or no previous experience in running events such as these. Many of us also work, so we have shared a number of the roles to make it more manageable. Together we have learnt new skills, created some fantastic events and had lots of fun in the process. We are lucky enough to be supported by many talented parents who assist the committee with other jobs such as publicity materials, website design and sponsorship.

We also couldn't do our job without the support of our fantastic class reps.

Class Representatives

Our Class Reps undertake a very important role. There are usually two reps per class (as they can share duties / ideas) who provide a link between class parents and the PTFA committee. It is helpful if one of the class reps is able to attend the PTFA meeting but minutes are always available if that is not possible. Class Reps are vital when it comes to transferring information from the PTFA to parents. We really could not manage without them, when it comes to helping with our main fundraising events. From promoting PTFA events, organising stalls and volunteers for the 2 fairs, or arranging a night out, the class reps really are invaluable and we would be grateful for all parents to support their reps as much as possible. PTFA Volunteers

We have a growing list of PTFA volunteers who commit some of their time to helping the committee. Every little helps, so just one hour assisting at an event is invaluable. We really do need everyone to help a little, rather than it all falling on a few.

Committee Meetings

Everyone is welcome at the PTFA Committee Meetings which are held every half term. Pre-school children are welcome to attend the meetings, there are toys and books to keep them occupied, snacks and tea and coffee for the adults.

Annual General Meeting (AGM)

We hold our Annual General Meeting (AGM) in October at which we elect our committee for the following year. So, if you would like to help give the school better facilities and ensure our children have lots of extra-curricular activities, come along and join us.

How we raise money

Like most PTFAs, the majority of our funds are raised through the events that we run. Some of our most popular fundraising events / activities are:

- Cake Sales
- Religious celebrations
- Winter Fair
- Summer Fair
- Quiz night
- Swish and Pamper Night
- Movie afternoon

We always welcome ideas for new events and try and respond to the children's requests; it is great to see them having fun at the events or enjoying using a piece of new equipment that the PTFA has donated towards.

Donations

We raise money in other ways too and donations from parents are extremely important. You can donate time, money, raffle prizes and auction lots or offers of services and skills. Some parents have also expressed an interest to donate a regular amount to the PTFA either, monthly, quarterly or annually and we are currently looking at the best way to enable this, incorporating Gift Aid.

Easy Fundraising

We have some exciting news! We're now registered with easyfundraising, the UK's biggest charity shopping fundraising website. This website allows us to receive donations directly from brands when you use the site to shop with all your favourite stores online.

To help us get up and running, for a limited time only, we have been offered an additional incentive!

How we spend the money we raise

PTFA funds are spent on the 'extras' that are not completely provided for by the school's budget, thus making our children's learning experiences so much more fulfilling and exciting. In the current economic climate, with impending cuts to schools, the work the PTFA does, is essential to support our school to deliver the best environment possible.

The PTFA makes an annual donation to the school. School leaders and governors decide how this money is spent, typically on capital projects which benefit all children, for example, library

refurbishment or improving playground facilities. School leaders explain how the money has been spent to the Committee and other parents who attend regular PTFA meetings.

How we get information to you

We try to write a PTFA newsletter every half term. These aim to update the school on the past and future events, how much money has been raised and what it is being spent on. These newsletters are uploaded to the school website and circulated via the class reps.

Class reps are often sent information by the committee, which we ask them to pass on to the class. The way this information is passed onto you depends on class preference but may involve email or a Facebook page, Twitter or a mixture of all two.
